In addition, his research is interested in the inspirations and discouragements that propel or withhold these constituents to flourish in academia. Furthermore, upon entry into the university, there is a challenge/invitation for system impacted folks to reflect on their views of the world. What changes happen to their values? What is their experience with this constant reflection? Lastly, Andy's research aims to illuminate this subaltern society, as well as validate its experiences and epistemologies. Despite the stereotypes and the hardships that formerly incarcerated folks face, they create beauty within these instances of destruction and terror. The academic experiences of formerly incarcerated students, must be examined in order to provide a more welcoming space for them on college campuses.

Faculty Mentor: **Dr. Jose Anguiano**

Bio: Bryan's research examines how Mexican-American youth enact cultural citizenship through their consumption and/or production of urban regional corridos, the contemporary take on the Mexican borderland traditional ballad focused on storytelling. He is interested in the intersection of Black hip-hop culture and contemporary corrido culture and how both Black and Brown young people understand their positionalities as expressed through music. Bryan is currently in the beginning stages of conceptualizing an urban regional corridista consciousness: the intersection of Black Hip-hop culture and contemporary corrido culture and the political claims in corridos tumbados. The corrido tumbado is a contemporary pillar of identity for South L.A. Mexican-American youth, signaling how important it is for this population to narrate their own stories and highlight their struggles for power.

Bio: Eduardo is interested in researching the psychological outcomes of racial discrimination and its effects on identity development and resilience among minority groups (e.g., Latinx, and Native Americans/Indigenous). In addition, he is determined to explore the coping mechanisms that members of different cultural groups use to overcome social inequalities such as poverty and police brutality to achieve a better life. Currently, Eduardo is investigating how political activism and a positive sense of self could enhance or diminish resilience among undocumented Latinx individuals. As a future academic and therapist, he is committed to developing culturally sensitive and inclusive therapy, pedagogy, and conducting empirical research. He hopes the results of his academic work improve mental health theories and practices regarding underprivileged groups – LGBTQ. Lastly, Eduardo looks forward to offering a safe space and guidance to students of underrepresented communities to conduct cross-cultural research that could have positive outcomes in their communities.

Bio: Brian's studies are situated in literature, poetry, and testimonio as historical sources and forces, placing emphasis on pedagogical instruments that can be utilized to develop critical consciousness and consciousness-raising in relation to, but not limited to, healing from social/historical trauma and recovering and reclaiming the body as a decolonial praxis. His research interests are expressed in critically-engaged ethnographic accounts of the ways in which undocumented people from Central America experience forced displacement and the violence of migration and are being incorporated to the capitalistic global economy, a process manifested in the extended production of the migrant industrial complex. As a researcher in Mexico, Brian's investigation extends the scope of their project on migration processes in Latin America, focusing on the ways in which translocal social assemblages and diasporic cultural production contribute to specific forms of abolition and community organizing, class struggle, and ontological self-making.

NON-RESIDENT GRADUATE STUDENT TUITION FEE WAIVER

Non-Resident tuition fee waivers are granted to non-resident graduate students who are either domestic non-resident students or citizens of a foreign country. Awardees must demonstrate exceptional scholastic ability and prior scholastic achievement, as well as financial need. Recipients receive a non-resident tuition fee waiver of up to 20 units within an academic year. Recipients must enroll in at least 10 semester units per term or be employed by the CSU for 20 hours or more a week, but less than full time. To maintain eligibility, awardees must remain classified as an International or Non-Resident student. This year, twenty-eight (28) students received the Non-Resident Graduate Student Tuition Fee Waiver.

TRAVEL SUPPORT GRANT RECIPIENTS

The Travel Support for Student Presentations is a reimbursement program designed to encourage and assist Cal State LA graduate students whose work has been accepted for presentation at a professional or academic conference.

The graduate students presenting who are funded through this program receive a partial reimbursement (up to 70%) of cost for travel, lodging, and conference registration in support of their presentation. The graduate students attending a conference for professional development receive a partial reimbursement (up to 50%) of cost for travel, lodging, and conference registration to attend the conference. Under these circumstances, the Office of Graduate Studies funded conference registrations (up to 100%) to graduate students who presented or attended a virtual conference.

Dr. Whitcomb was nominated for the Faculty Mentor Award by six members of the Cal State LA International Collegiate Business Strategy Competition team. They attribute their success to her consistent expert guidance and support as their faculty advisor. Since 2015, she helped the ICBSC team prepare for ten competitions resulting in three first place awards and three first runner awards. Dr. Whitcomb is retiring after 38 years on faculty. She is leaving a legacy of alumni in the business community who benefited from her excellence in teaching and professional mentorship.

DR. ANNA OSIPOVA

Charter College of Education
Department of Special Education and Counseling

Dr. Anna Osipova has been very involved with graduate students since joining Cal State LA as an assistant professor in 2016. During AY 2020-2021, Dr. Osipova chaired three MA students' thesis committees, served as a committee member on two Ed.D. dissertations, and chaired one doctoral dissertation. She currently serves as a committee member on three 2nd year doctoral committees. Dr. Osipova has had four graduate student mentees that have presented at professional conferences. She supervised graduate assistants who developed curricular activities for the C. Lamar Mayer Learning Center, such as literacy curriculum review, and math instruction for students with significant disabilities. This academic year she published with three graduate students on topics including, "Latinx Students and Families and AAC: A Literature Review," "The Need for Culturally and Linguistically Responsive AAC for Latinx Students.," "Re-examining Effective Reading Instruction for English Learners with Intellectual Disabilities," and "CSU special education reading courses: What we teach and how we teach it." Dr. Osipova is described by her students as having a "warm and caring mentorship style" and as being "a wonderful mentor and highly deserving of this honor for her work with graduate students."

DR. MOHSEN ESHRAGHI

College of Engineering, Computer Science, and Technology
Department of Mechanical Engineering

Dr. Mohsen Eshraghi began his appointment as Assistant Professor of Mechanical Engineering in Fall 2014. He was awarded early tenure and promotion in May 2019. His research is in additive manufacturing and microstructure formation of metal alloys, an area of investigation critical to American manufacturing, with important applications for future space travel. His work includes both laboratory experiments, including one on the space station, and computational experiments in solidification of alloys in space. To support his work, and his graduate students, he has been awarded almost \$1M in research awards as PI or co-PI from NSF and NASA, much if it in collaboration with universities around the country. He has also served as senior personnel on both the \$3M PREM and the \$5M DIRECT-STEM grants from the National Science Foundation, both interdisciplinary ECST-NSS collaborations with significant support for graduate students. He has published two book chapters, 14 journal publications, and 29 conference publications since the start of his career at Cal State LA, many of them with student authors or student presenters. Dr. Eshraghi has mentored ten graduate students to completing their MS degrees, and is currently advising another 5 students.

FACULTY MENTOR HONOREES

DR. ALEJANDRO COVARRUBIAS

College of Ethnic Studies
Department of Chicana(o) and Latina(o) Studies

During AY 2020-2021, Dr. Alejandro Covarrubias has been the mentor of two graduate students through the Graduate Assistantship Program. These research mentees had the opportunity to present their research in collaboration with Dr. Covarrubias at the National Association of Chicana and Chicano Scholars (NACCS). He is also the faculty mentor in a student curated research project known as, the GRITO Series, which is an oral history project that broadcasts interviews with ethnic studies trailblazers to the public. Within this group, there are a total of five students. His students report that without Dr. Covarrubias' research and connections in the community, the GRITO Series would not have come to fruition. Although his support and guidance are critical to the success of the GRITO Series, Dr. Covarrubias insists that all credit be attributed to the students who work on the Series. Through the GRITO Series, students gain access to important career development opportunities such as event production, event marketing/ advertising, logistical planning, event hosting, zoom facilitation, archival analysis/research, and communications. He motivates and challenges his students to use their creativity to develop projects within their field of study. Dr. Covarrubias inspires his students to engage in movement building within the classroom and outside of it. For these reasons, and many more, Dr. Covarrubias is recognized for his role as an educator, mentor, and student success catalyst.

DR. JESSICA DENNIS

Rongxiang Xu College of Health and Human Services
Department of Child and Development Studies

Dr. Dennis has been serving as the Chair of the Department of Child and Family Studies since 2019. Prior to this appointment, she was a faculty member in the Department of Psychology since 2005 and served as the Director of the MA in Psychology Program from 2011-2019. Dr. Dennis is a mentor to students in both the MA in Child Development and MA in Psychology programs; she is currently working with six thesis students. She fosters professional collaboration among students in her research lab, the Center for Multicultural Research. Dr. Dennis chaired a symposium at the Western Psychological Association conferences 2021 showcasing ongoing research within the lab. The symposia provide an opportunity for her students to present their research to a professional audience. Since 2016, Dr. Dennis' graduate student mentees have presented over 34 presentations at professional conferences: (14 posters and 17 oral presentations at the Western Psychological Association convention, 2 posters at the Asian American Psychological Association convention). Furthermore, her graduate students have presented 15 posters or oral presentations at the Cal State LA Symposium on Research and Scholarly Activities. Many of these students have won awards, including 2 who have been campus delegates for the CSU Research Symposium. Dr. Dennis has published 3 peer-reviewed journal articles with student mentees as co-authors, in the areas of: language brokering among Latino young adults; the role of family and community bicultural socialization in the bilingual proficiency of immigrant young adults; and bicultural competence and the Latino 2.5 generation. She has mentored nine MA students who were admitted into doctoral programs. Dr. Dennis is described as a dedicated research mentor who instills confidence in her students.

FACULTY MENTOR HONOREES

DR. ENRIQUE OCHOA

College of Natural and Social Sciences
Department of Latin American Studies

Dr. Enrique Ochoa is an energetic, dedicated and effective mentor to graduate students in both the Latin American Studies Program (LAS) and the History Department. He identifies and mentors students who have the interest and abilities to become PhD's in the Social Sciences or Humanities. For over 20 years, he has helped graduate students to acquire the research and writing skills that they will need to succeed in a doctoral program. He guides them through the application process and continues to serve as unofficial mentor throughout their doctoral career. He frequently invites his mentees back to Cal State LA so that they can meet with and peer mentor potential doctoral candidates. In the last five years, Dr. Ochoa mentored 37 graduate students; 27 have presented at professional conferences; and three have published in peer-reviewed journals. In AY 2020-21, when graduate programs across the country were decreasing admissions or suspending them all together, eight of his mentees – both current students and recent alumni -- were accepted into PhD programs. Several of them were accepted into more than one doctoral program, and all of them were awarded fellowship packages covering the entirety of their programs. We received sixteen letters of support from his current and past mentees. These testimonies described Dr. Ochoa as a transformative educator who is particularly effective in mentoring first-generation college students. Two statements capture the admiration they hold toward him:

Dr. Ochoa is truly what we consider an 'eje' or an axis to our community and a role model of our lives.

Truly a transformative teacher: No other teacher or professor has impacted my academic and overall personal growth more than Enrique Ochoa.
